RESOLUTION No. M2022-06

MAKING CONTINUED FINDINGS PURSUANT TO ASSEMBLY BILL 361
TO CONDUCT REMOTE PUBLIC MEETINGS FOR MCOG'S
LEGISLATIVE AND ADVISORY BODIES
DURING THE COVID-19 STATE OF EMERGENCY

WHEREAS,

- 1. The Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG) is committed to preserving and fostering public access and participation in its meetings, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Government Code 54950 54963), which makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, subject to the existence of certain conditions;
- 2. A state of emergency was proclaimed by Governor's Executive Order N-33-20 on March 4, 2020, addressing the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic, and remains in effect with certain modifications added since the original order, as part of a phased rollback of Executive Orders in response to the pandemic;
- 3. On September 16, 2021, the Governor signed into law AB 361, an urgency measure, that provides flexibility to government bodies, allowing them to meet virtually without conforming to the Brown Act teleconferencing rules during a declared state of emergency if: (a) State or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, (b) the legislative body is meeting to determine whether, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person presents imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, or (c) the legislative body has determined that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; AB 361 remains in effect through January 1, 2024;
- 4. The Mendocino County Health Officer's order dated March 9, 2022 states in part that "I continue to strongly recommend online public meetings (i.e., teleconferencing meetings) to the extent possible, as these meetings present the lowest risk of transmission of SARS CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. This recommendation is made due to the current community prevalence rates. While the winter surge has declined and the availability of hospital beds has improved, the County continues to be an area, defined by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), with "High Community Transmission" risk. In addition, rates remain high with the Omicron variant of COVID-19 being the predominant variant, the impact of which on the spread of COVID-19 has shown to dramatically increase the transmission of COVID-19...";
- 5. Due to the uncertainty and concerns about these current conditions, numerous state and local agencies, including Caltrans and Mendocino Transit Authority, continue to meet from separate remote locations:
- 6. Given the heightened risks of the predominant variant of COVID-19 in the community, holding meetings with all members of the legislative body, staff, and the public in attendance in person in a shared indoor meeting space would pose an unnecessary and immediate risk to the attendees;

- 7. These virtual meetings have not diminished the public's ability to observe and participate and have expanded opportunities to do so for some communities, and MCOG continues to provide for public access to its remote meetings; and
- 8. On October 4, 2021, MCOG's Board of Directors made findings of fact by Resolution #M2021-12 including additional background and pertinent details; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, THAT:

- The Mendocino Council of Governments adopts the recitals set forth above as findings of fact.
- MCOG has reconsidered circumstances of the state of emergency.
- MCOG hereby determines that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person.
- In accordance with AB 361, based on the findings and determinations herein, meetings of MCOG's legislative and advisory bodies will be held remotely by virtual means, suspending Brown Act teleconferencing rules while providing for all feasible means of public participation.
- This resolution shall be effective upon adoption and remain in effect until MCOG's next regular board meeting on June 6, 2022, when MCOG shall consider renewing its findings by subsequent resolution, in accordance with AB 361, or shall resume meeting in person.

MINUTES Monday, March 7, 2022

Teleconference Only
Pursuant to Brown Act and Assembly Bill 361

The Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG) meets as the Board of Directors of:

Mendocino Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) and Mendocino County Service Authority for Freeway Emergencies (SAFE)

1. Call to Order / Roll Call. The meeting was called to order at 1:36 p.m. with Directors Jim Brown, Greta Kanne, John Haschak, Michael Carter, Tatiana Ahlstrand (Caltrans/PAC), and Dan Gjerde present by Zoom teleconference; Chair Gjerde presiding. Director Scott Ignacio arrived subsequently. Director Tess Albin-Smith was excused by prearrangement. The Chair welcomed back Director Carter, recently reappointed.

<u>Staff present</u>: Nephele Barrett, Executive Director; Janet Orth, Deputy Director & CFO; Loretta Ellard, Deputy Planner; Lisa Davey-Bates, Transportation Planner; James Sookne, Program Manager; and Danielle Casey, Program Coordinator. Jody Lowblad, Administrative Assistant, was introduced.

Note: Public comment was invited via email and online comment form; staff monitored for incoming comments throughout the meeting, reporting periodically.

- 2. Convene as RTPA
- 3. Recess as RTPA Reconvene as Policy Advisory Committee
- **4 5. Consent Calendar.** Deputy Director Orth noted an administrative correction to the resolution, so that it remains in effect until April 4, 2022. Executive Director Barrett also commented on the resolution, noting that conditions are changing, the Board of Supervisors plans to return to chambers, and staff will reassess the situation before the next meeting. The Chair invited public comment; none were heard.

Upon motion by Haschak, second by Carter, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (6 Ayes – Brown, Kanne, Ignacio, Haschak, Carter, Ahlstrand/PAC, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 2 Absent – Ignacio and Albin-Smith): IT IS ORDERED that consent items are approved.

4. Adoption of Resolution Making Continued Findings Pursuant to Assembly Bill 361 to Conduct Public Meetings Remotely for MCOG's Legislative and Advisory Bodies During the COVID-19 State of Emergency.

7. Covelo Trail Ad Hoc Committee Recommendations of February 25, 2022: Approval of Additional Allocation from Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Partnership Funding Program for Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail Project to Accommodate Extension of Professional Services Agreement with Right-of-Way Consultant. Ms. Barrett reviewed her staff report, with a request for additional funding for the contract with Bender Rosenthal Incorporated (BRI). The increase is necessary due to the enhanced role of Caltrans in delivering the project, which called for certain standards in the right-of-way acquisition process. She credited BRI with successfully completing the right-of-way certification in time for the allocation of construction funds by the California Transportation Commission (CTC). However there are tasks remaining in the scope of work leading up to construction of the trail. The contract is currently funded with MCOG's Partnership Program funds at \$155,358; staff recommends the proposed increase of \$61,870 from the same source, for a new total not to exceed \$217,228.

Director Ignacio arrived at approximately 1:40 p.m.

Director Haschak reported the ad hoc committee concurred with staff's recommendation, as the only way forward to complete this worthy project. No public comment was heard.

Upon motion by Brown, second by Haschak, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (7 Ayes – Brown, Kanne, Ignacio, Haschak, Carter, Ahlstrand/PAC, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 1 Absent – Albin-Smith): IT IS ORDERED that, as recommended by staff and the ad hoc committee, an additional \$61,870 from the Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Partnership Program is allocated for an amendment to the Professional Services Agreement with Bender Rosenthal Incorporated to complete remaining right-of-way tasks on the Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail Project, and the agreement is extended through June 2023.

8. Adoption of Resolution Authorizing the Executive Director to Execute Applications and Agreements Required to Process Documentation for the Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail Project to the Bureau of Indian Affairs. Ms. Barrett reported this item was recommended by the above-mentioned right-of-way consultant BRI. An existing resolution authorizes the execution of documents related to the trail project. Since an application is underway with the federal Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) related to three properties within the trail limits, it was advisable to have a resolution specific to this project and working with BIA, to help make the process go more smoothly. No public comments were heard.

Upon motion by Ignacio, second by Haschak, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (7 Ayes – Brown, Kanne, Ignacio, Haschak, Carter, Ahlstrand/PAC, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 1 Absent): IT IS ORDERED that the following resolution is adopted.

Authorizing the Executive Director to Execute Applications and Agreements Required to Process Documentation for the Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail Project to the Bureau of Indian Affairs (Reso. #M2022-05 is incorporated herein by reference)

- 9. Executive Committee Recommendations of February 28, 2022
 - a. Approval of Extensions to Professional Services Agreements through September 30, 2023
 - i. Administration & Fiscal Services Dow & Associates
 - ii. Planning Services Davey-Bates Consulting (DBC)

Ms. Barrett reviewed her staff report and the Executive Committee's recommendation, noting that Dow & Associates and Davey-Bates Consulting contracts with MCOG are for a five-year period with five one-year extensions. The current extension of contracts will expire September 30, 2022. She and Ms. Davey-Bates invited questions or comments. It was also noted the contracts allow up to four percent increases annually, applying the Consumer Price Index (CPI) rate, with any additional increase requiring board approval. Currently the rate is 4.2 percent.

In board discussion, Director Brown supported the recommended action, stating it would be consistent with the way these contracts have been handled in recent years, which has worked well to date. No public comments were received.

Upon motion by Brown, second by Haschak, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (7 Ayes – Brown, Kanne, Ignacio, Haschak, Carter, Ahlstrand/PAC, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 1 Absent): IT IS ORDERED that, as recommended by the Executive Committee, the existing contracts for Administration & Fiscal Services and Planning Services are extended for one year through September 30, 2023, including an increase of 4.2 percent, and the Chair is authorized to execute the agreements.

Ms. Barrett and Ms. Davey-Bates expressed their appreciation.

b. Draft FY 2022/23 Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) Budget. Ms. Orth summarized highlights of her written report, with a focus on the Local Transportation Funds (LTF) from sales tax revenue. FY 2020/21 resulted in a new record high of \$5 million and a substantial surplus to carry forward in 2022/23. The County Auditor's new estimate of \$5.1 million is 13.5 percent above the 2021/22 estimate and came with an expectation that the unusual growth during the pandemic will level off to about one percent in the coming year. The recommendation was cautionary, as such a surplus might not appear again soon, and the Executive Committee concluded that 15 percent of the estimate should be kept in LTF Reserve, available for Mendocino Transit Authority's future needs. MTA typically receives the largest LTF allocation, and under the Transportation Development Act (TDA) is subject to an eligibility test for costs at year end, so might not be able to spend a large increase in a single year. Therefore staff encouraged MTA to consider claiming a portion for other than operational purposes, such as capital projects and unmet transit needs. The recommendation provides \$4.6 million for transit, up 13.7% or \$557,354 compared to 2021/22.

No public comments were received. A budget workshop will be offered as usual at the May meeting. This report was for information only; no action was taken.

10. Recess as Policy Advisory Committee – Reconvene as RTPA – Ratify Action of Policy Advisory Committee. Upon motion by Carter, second by Kanne, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (6 Ayes – Brown, Kanne, Ignacio, Haschak, Carter, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 1 Absent): IT IS ORDERED that the actions taken by the Policy Advisory Committee are ratified by the MCOG Board of Directors.

11. Reports - Information

a. <u>Caltrans District 1 – Projects Update and Information</u>. Director Ahlstrand gave an update on the Hopland ADA project, with the environmental document expected at end of March, so the community meeting is now planned for April 13. Caltrans staff will attend the next Hopland Municipal Advisory Council meeting to discuss the project.

She also reported on the Clean California grants: 16 proposals were received in District 1, and seven were selected. One project is in Mendocino County, to the Manchester Band of Pomo Indians at \$264,038 for cleanup and removal of waste and overgrown vegetation. Caltrans will seek other ways for more projects to be funded on the state highway system,

- and there might be another round of Clean California grants coming. It was clarified that these are in addition to clean-up projects that Calrans implements directly.
- b. Mendocino Transit Authority. There was no MTA representative present to report.
- c. North Coast Railroad Authority. Director Haschak reported the anticipated news that on March 14 the agency will meet as NCRA for the first hour, then transition to meet as the Great Redwood Trail Authority. The California Coastal Conservancy will likely participate.
- d. MCOG Staff Summary of Meetings. Ms. Barrett referred to the written report.

e. MCOG Administration Staff

- i. *Miscellaneous*. Ms. Orth reported on a California Energy Commission grant opportunity for Rural Electric Vehicle Charging, due March 11, with \$1.6 million slated for the 16 North State counties. In conversations with multiple vendors, she received a request from ChargePoint for a letter of intent that MCOG would help identify community locations. Staff intends to sign the letter, consistent with the 2022 Regional Transportation Plan, and Planning staff has time available in a work element for such purposes. She offered support letters for any other Mendocino applications, noting the County is working on a proposal. Chair Gjerde agreed with exchanging support letters and described the County's project to electrify its vehicles, providing chargers for the fleet at night and for its workforce and public by day. He and Ms. Barrett coordinated on contacts.
- ii. Next Meeting Date. Monday, April 4, 2022, unless cancelled for lack of board business.

f. MCOG Planning Staff

- i. 2022 Regional Transportation Plan & Active Transportation Plan Final Adopted.

 Deputy Planner Ellard reported several corrections to Appendix maps, as directed by the Council to depict current alignment of US-101 and the Willits Bypass. The final plan is posted on MCOG's website and submitted to Caltrans as appropriate.
- ii. Feasibility Study Mobility Solutions for Rural Communities of Inland Mendocino County. Ms. Ellard reported that a consultant had not been selected yet, and the request for proposals was reissued with proposals due April 6.
- iii. *Local Road Safety Plans Update*. Ms. Ellard reported the consultant is working on the individual plans and scheduling presentations to each of the cities and county in April. The plans will identify priority projects as candidates for federal grants.
- iv. Miscellaneous. None.
- g. MCOG Directors. Director Haschak reported working with Caltrans on funding dump days for Covelo, Ukiah, Willits, Laytonville, Gualala and Caspar. The events have been successful in other counties at recovering substantial amounts of trash from the environment. Discussion followed on details and logistics, making available resources through the Clean California program.
- h. <u>California Association of Councils of Governments (CALCOG) Delegates</u>. Ms. Orth reported there will be a webinar series in place of the annual forum. Chair Gjerde asked that staff share the annual members when available.
- **16. Adjournment.** The meeting was adjourned at 2:15 p.m.

1. Call to Order at 10:00 a.m. with all present, Chair Gjerde presiding.

2. Public Expression - None.

3. Review & Recommendation on Options for Staffing Services Starting October 1, 2022 and Possible Contract Extensions. Contractor Nephele Barrett referred to her written staff report and proposals in the agenda packet, then presented available options for the staffing contracts with Dow & Associates for Administrative & Fiscal Services and Davey-Bates Consulting for Planning Services. She pointed out the contracts limit CPI inflation increases to four percent unless approved. The present rate is 4.2 percent, however they did not request the additional amount. She emphasized that options are offered, but no recommendation, as staff cannot recommend on their own contracts. If another one-year extension is approved, the term would be October 1, 2022 through September 30, 2023. Contractor Lisa Davey-Bates concurred with the presentation and expressed a desire to be fair and to contain costs, as inflation is expected to rise. The source of the specific CPI rate was identified and briefly noted.

In board discussion, Dan expressed satisfaction with the service provided and asked how the CPI and health benefit increases were applied. Nephele replied the CPI and benefits were reflected in the new year's base rate. It was acknowledged the benefits paid are by agreement between the contractors and their employees.

Tess supported the proposal and was happy with service to date.

Scott also approved and considered the agenda packet well presented. He suggested rewarding staff with the full 4.2 percent increase; Dan agreed. Nephele confirmed the budget had capacity for it.

Recommendation:

Upon motion by Ignacio, seconded by Albin-Smith, and carried on roll call vote (3 Ayes; 0 Noes; 0 Absent), the Executive Committee recommended that the Council approve the fourth one-year contract extensions for Administrative & Fiscal Services provided by Dow & Associates and Planning Services provided by Davey-Bates Consulting, including a rate increase of 4.2% consistent with the Consumer Price Index.

- 4. Review & Recommendation on Draft 2022/23 Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) Budget. Janet presented the first draft budget, summarizing her written staff report and attachments provided in the meeting packet. Total available revenues from all sources are estimated at nearly \$9 million. With a surplus from the recently closed year and sales taxes coming in very high in the current year to date, several allocation options were available for consideration. (The summary sheet was shared for onscreen viewing.)
 - a. <u>Local Transportation Fund (LTF) New Revenue Estimate and Reserves</u>. Janet's report reviewed how the County Auditor-Controller calculated the estimate, noting the trend of high sales tax revenues is expected to level off to about one percent growth in the coming fiscal year. The estimate tends to be conservative, which is desirable as it is more likely to result in a surplus than a shortfall. The fund estimate is \$5,137,383, up 13.5% (\$611,603) from the FY 2021/22 initial estimate.

Staff recommended setting the LTF Reserve at ten percent of the Auditor's estimate, double the policy minimum for a second consecutive year, due to the high unallocated surplus of \$754,417 from audited FY 2020/21 revenues, releasing for allocation \$694,150 in 2022/23 after flowing through the reserve calculation. Janet then reviewed the proposed allocations.

- b. Administration. The total Administration budget proposal is up 3.0% (\$18,531) from all sources. LTF costs continue a downward trend from around 11% of the Auditor's estimate to less than 10%. As a percentage of total revenues from all sources, Administration has been consistently about five percent. Other Direct Costs (i.e. not in the contract) drop from \$54,000 to \$48,000, a reduction from past levels of \$50-\$60,000. This is due to cost savings during the pandemic. Staff's proposal is \$640,079 from: LTF (\$460,494), RSTP (\$92,918), and Service Authority for Freeway Emergencies/ SAFE (41,585). This would need to be adjusted for the additional 0.2% added in the contract recommendation if approved. There were no objections to the proposed Administration budget.
- c. Two Percent Bicycle & Pedestrian Program. This amount is a calculated formula for an optional allocation up to two percent, according to Transportation Development Act (TDA) law. After Administration is subtracted, 2% of the new LTF fund estimate comes to \$92,578. MCOG issues a call for eligible projects every two years to the Technical Advisory Committee and awards are made by the Council. There were no objections to allocating the full two percent.
- d. Planning Overall Work Program (OWP). The funding proposal was prepared by Planning staff. Alexis presented the draft program details. There is a proposed increase to the LTF proposal, from \$147,701 last year to \$314,438 (increase of \$166,737 or 113%), primarily due to a Project Reserve of \$150,000 for needed MTA planning studies, pending outcome of a grant application. The draft OWP is reviewed annually by the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) for recommendation to the Council. After comments are received from Caltrans, the final OWP is presented to the Council in the May budget workshop, for adoption in June. There were no objections to the proposed OWP budget.
- e. <u>Balance Available for Transportation</u>. The balance of LTF available to MTA for claiming comes to \$4,886,888, up \$815,221 (20%) from FY 2021/22. This will be the second successive year that LTF for transit exceeds \$4 million.

The preliminary fund estimate for State Transit Assistance (STA), from fuel taxes, is \$868,476, added to the audited unallocated fund balance of \$163,120 and a projected 2021/22 balance of \$135,779, for a total available to claim of \$1,167,375. Including LTF, STA, Capital Reserve, and State of Good Repair funds, total revenues for transit are \$6,656,632.

Questions and discussion included:

- What is included in the multimodal work element? A wide range of support activities includes bicycle, pedestrian, rail and transit planning. Discussion of bike share systems, ways to get more people to use alternative transportation modes, and incentives to build more sidewalks. Walking and cycling may be cheaper than transit services. Deputy Planner Loretta Ellard is currently in contact with Walk & Bike Mendocino about available grants through the California Air Resources Board's Clean Mobility program. Planning funds can be used to study the issues and educate local officials. (Dan, Alexis, Nephele)
- What is intended for the OWP Project Reserve of \$150,000? In the near term, MTA needs a five-year Short Range Transit Development Plan, as the last one expired several years ago and the next update has been unfunded. An application is pending for a Caltrans planning grant. The reserve would fund either the plan or a transit hub feasibility study. As part of the effort, MTA could also use local funds for a Caltrans Intercity plan to better connect northern counties with MTA services. (Jacob, group)
- Conditions have changed since the last time MTA investigated transit center locations; now there is a
 rail trail through the area that could connect cyclists with bus service. Several connection points have
 been identified. Connectivity is appropriate for an interregional transit center project, including park
 and ride, electric vehicle charging, bicycle storage and other services. (Dan, Jacob, Nephele)
- Questions about MTA's capital program, which is mostly planned for the zero emission bus fleet program, a new transit hub, and a contactless payment system. (Scott, Jacob)
- The revised senior centers formula distribution of LTF funds begins in 2022/23, as contracted with MTA for specialized services. It will be good to start when funding is at a high level. (Nephele)
- In general discussion is was noted that MTA's ridership is on the rise again after the long downturn.
- Consideration of an optimal level for LTF Reserve; support for reserving more than ten percent. 15% would come to \$771,000 and release for allocation \$437,150. Balance of LTF available for transit would be \$4,657,106, still more than half a million over last year. Agreement to increase LTF Reserve to 15%. (Dan, Janet, group)

Recommendation:

Upon motion by Ignacio, seconded by Albin-Smith, and carried on roll call vote (3 Ayes; 0 Noes; 0 Absent), the Executive Committee recommended approval of staff's recommended Draft 2022/23 Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) Budget, adjusted for inflation and the increased reserve, for further development during the annual budget process, including:

- LTF Reserve fund balance of 15 percent, \$771,000, triple the minimum allowed under policy, releasing for allocation \$437,150
- A reserved balance of LTF prior-year unallocated revenues of \$29,135
- \$509,379 LTF for Administration
- \$92,560 LTF for 2% Bicycle & Pedestrian Program, allocating the full optional 2%
- \$315,488 LTF for the Planning program
- \$4,657,106 LTF for Transit
- Allocations from other sources for the Transportation Planning Overall Work Program (OWP) as recommended by staff and Technical Advisory Committee
- Allocations from the Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program according to policy and the staffing contract (preliminary estimate pending).
- Summary of recommended budget is attached.
- **5. Reports** / **Information** / **Members' Concerns.** Nephele advised that another Executive Committee meeting would be needed to address issues with startup of participation in the new RuralREN (Regional Energy Network), once approved by the California Public Utilities Commission.
- **6. Adjournment.** The meeting was adjourned at 11:39 a.m.

BACKGROUND:

The final audit report for the year ended June 30, 2021 has been completed by the independent CPA, R. J. Ricciardi, Inc., of San Rafael. Once again, MCOG has received a favorable and compliant audit. There were no current or prior-year observations for management concerning internal controls. All previous recommendations have been implemented.

The report was received March 25, 2022. Occasionally in past years, the Executive Committee has reviewed the audit report prior to acceptance by the full Council. This year, no issues arose in the audit report (nor was it ready in time for the meeting). Formerly, it was agreed that with no findings or recommendations by the auditor, the committee did not need to convene for that purpose.

MCOG has 15 separate funds in a trust account held in the County treasury. The audit report, i.e. the "Basic Financial Statements," classifies them in certain ways and, according to standards, is not allowed to state a combined fund balance. I have summarized totals here for your reference, only to show the extent of assets for which MCOG is responsible.

The financial statements (considered a trial balance) are produced by staff (myself) on an accrual basis and audited by the independent CPA. The funds are held in the County Treasury and controlled by the County Auditor. MCOG's data is verified by the County's records. For the past ten years, this has proved to be an efficient system and is functioning well.

BACKGROUND:

Each fiscal year, MCOG engages an independent Certified Public Accountant to conduct a fiscal audit of Mendocino Transit Authority, to comply with the Transportation Development Act (TDA). R. J. Ricciardi, Inc., CPAs has a multi-year engagement after a competitive procurement. MTA received a favorable audit report as usual.

The report was due by end of December 2021, however MCOG staff granted a requested 90-day extension to MTA, as allowed under TDA. A copy of the Basic Financial Statements, dated March 30, 2022, was received by MCOG, attached.

MTA's net position decreased by \$362,822; total net position at June 30, 2021 was \$9,276,042, compared to the previous year at \$9,638,864. – Page 4

The fare box calculation was included as directed by TDA. The ratio of fare box revenue compared to operating expenses was 3.8% (down from 7.4% in the previous year), below the required 10%. The auditor notes the impact of the COVID-19 crisis on transit agencies statewide and the waiver of certain TDA regulations for this audit year. – Page 19

The CPA also provided a report on compliance with TDA, noting tests of compliance were performed and that: "In connection with the audit, nothing came to our attention that caused us to believe that Mendocino Transit Authority failed to comply with...[TDA]...and the allocation instructions and resolutions of Mendocino Council of Governments." – Page 24

Additionally, issues concerning MCOG are "eligibility" for TDA funds allocated to MTA and senior centers. Annually, the fiscal auditor tests for eligibility of the claimant (MTA) to receive TDA funds, which involves a formula according to California Code of Regulations (CCR) Section 6634. Any monies in excess of the amount eligible "shall be recovered" by the agency/commission/board (MCOG), according to Section 6649. For the fiscal year, MTA was found to be eligible for all TDA funds received except for State Transit Assistance (STA), for which the efficiency standards were not met. However, state law AB 90 exempts transit operators from meeting the STA efficiency standards for FY 2020/21.

The Notes to Financial Statements reveal that MTA received a concentration of 53% of its total revenue for the year from MCOG allocations of TDA funds, at \$3,019,623. Last year was 58%, also at \$3,019,623. TDA funds remain the largest single source of revenue for MTA. – Pages 8, 21

Note 2, Summary of Significant Accounting Policies, again acknowledges impact of the coronavirus pandemic. – Page 12

ACTION REQUIRED: Accept the Fiscal Year 2020/21 MTA fiscal audit, as a fiduciary duty of the Council.

ALTERNATIVES: None identified. The report was submitted to the State Controller as required, regardless of any MCOG action.

RECOMMENDATION:

Accept the FY 2020/21 MTA fiscal audit reports as presented by R. J. Ricciardi, Inc., Certified Public Accountants.

BACKGROUND:

Mendocino Transit Authority (MTA) will apply to Caltrans for funds available under the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5311 Non-Urbanized Program for Federal Fiscal Year 2022. This year, the formula program is being released as a two-year grant cycle. The estimated amount is Mendocino County's regional apportionment. Applications are due to Caltrans by April 29, 2022.

MCOG's last resolution approving 5311 funds was for FY 2020/21. In our 2021/22 budget the funds were listed as pending. This two-year cycle brings the funding into the current fiscal year and through to the 2022/23 budget.

To put this in context: "FTA's Fiscal Year 2022 full-year funding tables detail support for transit throughout the U.S. Posted in April 2022, the tables represent a historic investment of more than \$20 billion to transit agencies and communities to support public transportation throughout the country, thanks to the <u>Bipartisan Infrastructure Law</u>... Every single state, territory, and urban area is benefiting from a substantial increase in their federal transit funding in FY22."

MTA would be a sub-recipient. The funds can be used for operating, capital or planning. The proposed project consists of transit operations that the program is meant to assist in rural areas. Staff is not aware of any other claims. Eligible applicants must provide transit to the general public. Note that MTA is the designated Consolidated Transportation Services Agency for the region.

Executive Director Barrett's signature represents MCOG's certification that the regional agency has approved, by resolution, the programming of these funds for MTA and that MTA complies with certain standard requirements related to local funding match availability, coordination with other transportation service providers, and STIP requirements.

This has been considered a routine item with no reason to withhold support. Also note that when allocating Local Transportation Funds, the Transportation Development Act (TDA) requires a finding by MCOG of whether MTA is making full use of available federal funds.

ACTION REQUIRED:

Adopt the resolution to program these funds for MTA's Operating Assistance. The certification document, as part of the application, includes a statement that the regional agency has approved, by resolution, the programming of funds for this project. The Executive Director is able to certify the other assurances. (Certification statements are available on request.)

ALTERNATIVES:

If MCOG does not approve this action, MTA will not receive the federal operating assistance for which they are eligible. If another eligible recipient or subrecipient were to make a claim under this year's program, a decision would need to be made at a subsequent meeting.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt the attached resolution approving the programming of MCOG's FFY 2022 regional apportionment of FTA Section 5311 transit operating assistance funds and authorizing the Executive Director's signature on the certification documents for MTA's application.

TITLE: Covelo SR 162 Multi-Purpose Trail Project -

Authorizing Future Award of Contracts for

Construction and Construction Management

SUBMITTED BY: Nephele Barrett, Executive Director

BACKGROUND: The Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail Project will construct a Class I multi-purpose trail parallel to State Highway 162, a distance of approximately 1.5 miles through the community of Covelo, plus an east-west portion of the trail approximately 0.5 mile in length.

Over the last several months, some major milestones have been reached in the project. We are wrapping up project development, but as of the allocation at the January California Transportation Commission meeting, we have also entered the construction phase of the project. Two major tasks in the next few months will be to award a contract for construction management/resident engineer services and a construction contract. We expect to release a Request for Qualifications for the construction management contract in early May and award in June. Advertisement of a construction contract is tentatively planned for May or June with award in July or August.

Usually, MCOG staff is able to award consultant contracts that are consistent with funding amounts approved in the annual Overall Work Program and budget without specific Board approval. Because these upcoming contracts for the Covelo project are not typical of the types of contracts usually approved by MCOG staff, we are seeking advanced board authorization to award these contracts, as the time of award will likely fall between the June 6 and August 15 MCOG meeting.

The total funding available for construction and construction support is as follows:

Active Transportation Program \$2,672,000 Complete Streets (SHOPP) \$1,511,000 Total \$4,183,000

The most recent construction cost estimate is \$3,513,000 (including a 10% contingency). Construction management can have a range in costs depending on the extent of the services. Caltrans will be providing some tasks that would otherwise be done as part of the construction management contract. This type of contract is awarded based on qualifications rather than cost. The full scope is still being finalized, currently waiting for Caltrans feedback.

At this time, we are asking the MCOG Board for advanced authorization to award contracts, consistent with MCOG's procurement manual, as long as they are within the available funding. If the contracts exceed the amount of available funding, staff will come back to the board for action prior to awarding a contract.

ACTION REQUIRED: Authorize the Executive Director to award and execute contracts for construction and construction management/resident engineer services for the Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail project on the condition that contracts are within the available funding limits.

ALTERNATIVES: Do not authorize staff to award and execute contracts.

BACKGROUND: The FTA Section 5310 Program is a grant program intended to provide funding to private non-profit agencies for the purpose of providing transportation services to the elderly and disabled. The program provides two categories of funding—traditional 5310 funding for vehicles and equipment and the expanded program, which provides operating and mobility management funds. Although the program typically requires a local match, this cycle is fully funded with 5310 funds.

As part of the application process, the RTPA must review and score each local application under the traditional 5310 program and approve a regional priority list. The applications were due on March 3, and regional scores had to be submitted by March 31.

MCOG staff worked closely with the local potential applicants for the program. The Redwood Coast Senior Center was the only agency to submit a traditional application for a replacement vehicle. In addition, Mendocino Transit Authority, Coastal Seniors, and Consolidated Tribal Health submitted applications for operational funding, however, MCOG does not score those applications.

At this meeting, we will ask that the MCOG Board approve the project score and regional list by resolution (to be presented at the meeting) and authorize the director to sign any necessary documentation that will be required. Following MCOG Board action, the list and scores will be forwarded to Caltrans for their consideration. The state will conduct their own scoring process and will notify MCOG of any significant discrepancies between state scores and regional scores. A statewide project list is expected in the next couple months.

ACTION REQUIRED:

- 1. Receive staff report and scoring results.
- 2. Open public hearing. (Note: this public hearing does not require a legal notice only an opportunity to allow public input, per grant requirements.)
- 3. Receive public comments.
- 4. Close public hearing.
- 5. Action by MCOG—adoption of resolution.

ALTERNATIVES:

None identified.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt the resolution approving the project score, authorize the executive director to sign the required documentation, and authorize staff to forward the executed resolution and required documents to Caltrans for further processing.

BACKGROUND:

Last July, Caltrans solicited "innovative concept proposals" in preparation for potential federal funding proposed in the Biden Administration's American Jobs Plan. This call specifically requested concepts that align with statewide priorities, articulated in the <u>California Transportation Plan (CTP) 2050</u>, <u>Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI)</u>, and <u>Caltrans Strategic Plan (SP)</u>.

There was a quick turnaround and projects were selected by MCOG staff based on how well they aligned with Caltrans' criteria. MCOG submitted a total of six concepts, and the City of Fort Bragg submitted one concept. (*See list below*). Projects identified by MCOG staff were those that could be considered beyond the type of typical local projects, either due to scope or magnitude, as well as those we thought would align particularly well with the state's criteria. Some projects were intended to be a combination of planning and capital.

A total of 320 proposals were received statewide, 230 were determined to be "aligned" with the criteria, but only eight had what Caltrans was seeking and did not need further refinement. Each concept went through a multi-division review process by Caltrans Headquarters. The first step in the review process was to determine if concepts would add:

- GHG? If yes, are there substantial offsets to proposed GHG increase that would negate the increase?
- VMT?
- Lane Miles?
- Was concept aligned with CAPTI?
 - o If the answer to any of the first three questions was "yes," or if the answer to the CAPTI alignment question was "no," proposals were marked "not aligned."

The following list identifies Caltrans' determination for each project ("aligned" or "not aligned"). Caltrans has asked agencies with aligned projects for feedback regarding local project prioritization. At the state level, projects on the state highway system would be given the highest priority and those that are ready to move forward quickly would also rank higher.

This matter was discussed at the March 15 Caltrans District 1/RTPA Directors meeting. District 1 management advised that it was unlikely to result in funding for MCOG and that we shouldn't invest significant time in responding.

With this in mind, MCOG's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) reviewed this list of innovative concept proposals at their March 16, 2022, meeting, and opted to group projects in three tiers of priority. Placement in the tiers was based on a number of factors, including the extent of alignment with state goals, project readiness, and agency readiness. The TAC unanimously recommended the priorities identified below:

Tier 1

Brooktrails Second Access Ukiah Transit Center Noyo Harbor Multimodal Improvement Project

Tier 2

Great Redwood Trail, Ph.5 Mobility Solutions in Rural Communities

Tier 3

Orchard Avenue Extension

At this meeting, we are asking the MCOG Board to consider the TAC's recommended three-tiered priority list. Based on Board direction, staff will send the prioritized list to Caltrans and follow-up as needed.

ACTION REQUIRED: Consider TAC's recommendations regarding the tiered priority list, for forwarding to Caltrans.

ALTERNATIVES: None provided.

RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends that the MCOG Board approve the three-tiered priority list as recommended by the TAC, for submittal to Caltrans and follow-up as needed.

TITLE: Fiscal Year 2022/23 RTPA Budget Presentation & Workshop

BACKGROUND:

MCOG's standing committees typically meet and report during the spring budget season, so the May Council meeting is an opportunity to become familiar with any budget-related issues ahead of the final allocation decisions. At our May Board meeting, we plan to review the budget recommendations to date, along with a few visual slides to refresh the board members on MCOG's funding sources and procedures. The June meeting materials will include a complete budget package for adoption. My summary sheets and updated explanatory notes are attached.

As previously reported, the local sales tax revenues (Local Transportation Fund – LTF) came in at very high levels throughout the pandemic of the past two years. The 2020/21 audit shows a surplus of \$754,417, which is added to the 2022/23 available revenues. 2021/22 year-to-date revenues are also well above the LTF estimate. This is not to say we can expect the trend to continue, and the County Auditor's estimate indicates the revenues leveling off to around one percent growth in the coming year. With inflation on the rise, this is a time for careful resource management while an opportunity to meet vital needs.

Total available revenues from all sources are estimated at \$10.5 million, before the addition of funds carried over in the Planning program and construction funds for the Covelo trail project. The draft budget proposal triples the minimum LTF Reserve for transit to \$771,000 and still adds 14 percent (\$585,439) for MTA's claim. For the coming fiscal year, MCOG will be able to fund programs of the Regional Transportation Planning Agency and Mendocino Transit Authority with abundant sales tax revenues augmented by other funding sources.

a. Report of Revenues Fiscal Year to Date (FYTD) 2021/22

Note that receipts typically come in two months after taxes are collected. Monthly deposits have come in at a low of \$296,110 (Sept./Nov.) to a high of \$568,120 (Aug./Oct.). (Some of these variances can be explained by the State's system of advances and later reconciliation payments.) In February when the Acting County Auditor made the estimate, she projected an unrestricted balance of \$566,800. The final amount remains to be seen, and assuming there is a surplus, by MCOG policy it would be deposited to the LTF Reserve account for later allocation.

b. Executive Committee Recommendations of February 28, 2022

The Executive Committee meets annually to review staff's first draft of the budget for the upcoming fiscal year and any related issues as part of the budget process, and then reports to MCOG with recommendations. (Our report was presented to the full Council on March 7.) At their meeting of February 28, the Executive Committee unanimously recommended a draft budget that allocates LTF funds for Reserves, MCOG Administration (\$509,379), 2% Bicycle & Pedestrian (92,560), Planning (315,488), and the remainder available for Transit (\$4,657,106), consistent with established priorities for Local Transportation Funds. Also, funds are available from State Transit Assistance (STA), MCOG's Capital Reserve fund balance, and other sources for transit purposes. – refer to #16d

c. TAC Recommendation of February 16, 2022 – Draft Planning Overall Work Program

The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) has reviewed and recommended the Draft Planning Overall Work Program; this document was forwarded to Caltrans for comment, as required by March 1. Alexis Pedrotti has provided details in her staff report, attached. A total of \$1,046,598 is proposed from all funding sources for the Planning program. This amount is expected to increase as carryover amounts are identified (typically a program amendment is needed early in the new fiscal year). The final document will be presented for approval on June 6 along with the budget.

d. <u>Transit Productivity Committee (TPC) Recommendations of April 13, 2022 – Mendocino Transit Authority's Annual Transit Claim and Unmet Needs</u>

Typically, this committee meets in April or May to review and make recommendations on the transit claim, Unmet Transit Needs, transit standards and performance, and related matters. The TPC met April 13 and made several recommendations.

The annual transit claim for funds was received from MTA on April 1 and revised following the TPC meeting, received April 15 (attached). Staff had made an initial analysis for TPC review and advised an allocation in the claim specifically for the highest priority Unmet Transit Needs, all of which were to restore services cut during the pandemic, according to MTA's analysis of the needs list. Cost estimates were provided at the meeting. The TPC voted to recommend to MCOG a finding that all of the "high priority" Unmet Needs are "reasonable to meet" and are to be identified in MTA's claim for allocation.

After MCOG's programs, LTF funds available for Mendocino Transit Authority to claim for transit purposes come to \$4,657,106. The addition of \$1,167,375 of STA funds and \$701,179 of Capital Reserve funds brings the total available Transportation Development Act (TDA) funding for MTA to \$6,525,660, an increase of 20% (\$1,102,476).

You may note two other transit programs in the budget summary, State of Good Repair (from SB 1) and FTA Section 5311 regional apportionment, which have a separate process for approval of programming by MCOG resolutions. State of Good Repair flows through MCOG's cash accounts, while 5311 does not.

I do not have any new discussion to offer concerning the federal coronavirus relief funds from Congress over the past two years. The CARES Act and CRRSAA funding have gone directly to MTA and have not had any impact on MCOG's budget. For 2020/21 when there were concerns about shortfalls, those were identified in our budget, and for 2021/22 we moved those figures to an informational section. Please refer to the attached Explanatory Notes on Funding Sources for additional details.

ACTION REQUIRED:

As an advisory item for now, receive a presentation from staff. Discuss and consider the staff and committee recommendations made to date in preparing for budget allocations in June for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2022. Staff is available to answer any questions.

ALTERNATIVES:

Technically the budget could be adopted at the May 2 meeting, however required findings by resolution are not yet prepared. Staff's intent is to provide ample time for the Council to review and digest the material, so customarily the decision is made in June. If the decision were to be delayed beyond the June meeting, staff would offer options to mitigate any hardship for affected agencies.

RECOMMENDATION: No action; for information only.

LTF - Local Transportation Fund

- Generated from quarter-cent sales tax on all sales countywide. Fund estimate provided by County Auditor-Controller. Allocated by Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs).
- Governed by the Transportation Development Act (TDA).
- Transportation planning and public transit systems are supported by these revenues according to TDA.
- Notable since 2020/21 are online sales tax revenues, of which a formula share is received from a state pool.

LTF Reserve Fund

- Allowed under TDA, Section 6655, adopted by MCOG on June 7, 1999, revised April 2, 2001.
- Fund balance adjusted annually at minimum five percent of County Auditor-Controller's LTF estimate.
- Surplus allocated through annual budget process.
- To be used "for transit services provided by Mendocino Transit Authority (MTA) that have been funded by MCOG through the annual transit claim process, when 1) actual LTF revenues fall short of LTF budget allocations, or 2) extreme or unusual circumstances warrant an additional allocation."
- The fund was depleted to cover the FY 2008/09 revenue shortfall and policy waived in 2010/11 and 2011/12. The policy was partially waived for the three following fiscal years. A claim was made to meet the FY 2015/16 shortfall of \$68,364.
- Since 2015/16, MCOG has fully restored the LTF Reserve policy, releasing two years of surplus for allocation between \$100,000 and \$200,000, then a shortfall of \$65,000, a surplus of \$71,000, and for 2019/20 (from 2017/18 revenue) a record surplus of \$375,634. Audited surplus from 2020/21 is 754,417, a new record, for allocation in 2022/23.
- With no maximum by policy, in 2021/22 ten percent was reserved; the 2022/23 proposal is 15 percent.

STA - State Transit Assistance

- Generated from sales taxes on diesel and gasoline, until the Transportation Tax Swap of March 2010, when it was replaced by an increased excise tax on gasoline and increased sales tax on diesel. This expired with SB 1, the Road Repair & Accountability Act of 2017. The gas tax is now indexed to inflation.
- Governed by the Transportation Development Act (TDA).
- Eligibility is open only to transit operators MTA in Mendocino County.
- May be used for either Operations, subject to an eligibility formula based on certain cost efficiency standards, or for Capital. MTA typically has used STA for Capital purposes, until the operations requirement was waived for FY 2009/10 2015/16 during the Recession; again waived for the pandemic.
- Senate Bill 508, effective July 1, 2016, provides more flexibility, so that "rather than making an operator ineligible to receive State Transit Assistance program funds for operating purposes for an entire year for failing to meet the efficiency standards, would instead reduce the operator's operating allocation by a specified percentage, based on the percentage amount that the operator failed to meet the efficiency standards, as specified." from SB 508, Chapter 716, preamble
- State Controller provides fund estimate—"Preliminary" in January, "Revised" after State Budget adopted.
- Regional allocation policy: Respond to fluctuating revenues by releasing approved allocations to MTA
 when received in MCOG's fund account. At times there is an unallocated balance. Other times the fund
 is fully claimed and has only a small balance of interest earnings, as is the case this year.
- STA has fluctuated widely, subject to political influences, while generally rising over time. 20 years ago, annual revenues were about \$150,000; two years ago in the range of \$800-900,000 with support of SB 1. During the pandemic, fuel tax revenues dropped 20%. Preliminary estimate for 2022/23 is \$868,476.

Capital Reserve Fund

- Created and controlled by MCOG as allowed by Transportation Development Act (TDA), Section 6648.
- Contributions from LTF and/or STA.
- Open to Mendocino Transit Authority and Senior Centers for projects in MTA's Five-Year Capital Program.

Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) Program, Section 182.6(d)(1)

- Under ISTEA legislation originally, subsequently under TEA21, SAFETEA-LU, MAP-21 and FAST Act. Formerly named Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP).
- Section d(1) is for regional discretionary transportation uses, in compliance with U.S. Code, Title 23 and California Constitution, Article 19.
- As allowed, MCOG exchanges for state funds by agreement with Caltrans, eliminating federal requirements.
- MCOG allocated the early fund cycles by regional competition; all of those projects were closed out.
- Subsequent MCOG policy allocated new RSTP d(1) apportionments by formula to County and Cities.
- In FY 2003/04, MCOG staff introduced new administrative procedures in order to comply with new clauses in Caltrans' fund transfer agreement. MCOG requires local claimants to provide a list of eligible projects for which they plan to spend the formula funds, and an authorized officer must sign a certification document (replaced in 2017/18 with a master Subrecipient Agreement). Also they must report prior-year expenditures when claiming new funds.
- For the FY 2005/06 funding cycle and going forward, MCOG approved recommendations of staff and the Technical Advisory Committee to revise MCOG's allocation formula such that a portion would be reserved for MCOG's use on regional projects, aka "Partnership Funding Program" (see allocating resolution). To date the Council has allocated \$1,113,485 of Partnership funds to nine projects.
- Starting FY 2011/12, MCOG approved \$90,000 annually from RSTP for a Regional Project Manager.
- In FY 2015/16 and 2016/17, funds not expended for the project manager position were approved for direct costs that are consistent with the intended scope of Local Assistance; \$20,000 has been allocated.
- Total unexpended Local Assistance funds have accumulated due to a temporary vacancy in the position and funding limits of the staffing contract, with a balance as of June 30, 2021 of \$240,656.
- In California, 2021 federal coronavirus relief funds will be apportioned partly by STBG formula, partly through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), as well as for transit programs. see Page 3

PPM - Planning, Programming & Monitoring / SB 45

- Apportioned by State to Regional Transportation Planning Agencies for work associated with State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) projects.
- Up to 5% of Regional Improvement Program (RIP) funds in the STIP may be used for eligible activities.
- MCOG has programmed funds for planning work elements and Project Study Reports (PSRs).

RPA - Rural Planning Assistance

- Traditionally, either State or Federal funds have been provided in some form of subvention.
- This program is funded by the State for required Overall Work Program mandated planning functions.
- Competitive RPA grants include MCOG's 2013 Zero Emission Vehicle (ZEV) Regional Readiness Plan.

Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant Program

- This program replaced the Consolidated Planning Grant Program, which included Community Based Transportation Planning, Environmental Justice, and Transit Planning grants.
- Funded by Federal Transit Administration (FTA, Section 5304) and State Highway Account.
- MCOG was awarded seven annual Community Based Transportation Planning grants and one Environmental Justice grant as a sponsor, administered through the Planning Overall Work Program, including projects for Gualala, Laytonville, Point Arena, Westport, Ukiah Rails-With-Trails, Covelo/Round Valley, and Anderson Valley/SR-128 Trail.
- City of Willits completed the grant-funded Willits Main Street Corridor Enhancement Plan.
- MCOG completed its Pedestrian Facility Needs Engineered Feasibility Study in 2019. The SB 743
 Vehicle Miles Travelled Regional Baseline Study and Mendocino County Fire Vulnerability Assessment
 & Emergency Preparedness Plan were completed in 2020. In FY 2021/22 MCOG was awarded a grant for a Feasibility Study: Mobility Solutions for Rural Communities of Inland Mendocino County.

Active Transportation Program (ATP)

- Competitive State grant program combining state and federal funds for bicycle and pedestrian projects.
- Cycles 1 and 2 funded MCOG's Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail, in progress.
- In 2018, MCOG completed Safe Routes to School Non-Infrastructure ATP grant projects in Covelo and countywide. In 2020 MCOG applied for Gualala Downtown Streetscape Enhancement project (not funded).

Local Agency Match

- Local matching funds are required for some state and federal grants.
- Mendocino Transit Authority has contributed the required local match for their projects.
- Gualala, Laytonville, and Westport have provided in-kind local match contributions.
- MCOG typically provides required cash match from local planning funds in Overall Work Program.
- FY 2020/21 included \$308,900 from the five member local agencies for Local Road Safety Plans, from state grants and ten percent matching funds, to pool resources for consultant services through the OWP.

Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act

- Signed into law in March 2020, funds are available to transit operators through FTA's 5311 programs.
- MCOG included CARES in its adopted FY 2020/21 budget at \$1,206,413, including Phase 1 and 2 balance of funds available at the time, to offset a potential shortfall of local funds for transit.
- "Funding is provided at a 100-percent federal share, with no local match required, and is available to support capital, operating, and other expenses generally eligible under those programs to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19." [from FTA website]

Coronavirus Response & Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2021 (CRRSAA)

- This bill became law in December 2020, including funds for various transportation programs.
- California has chosen to suballocate its apportionment of infrastructure funding through STBG and STIP.
 MCOG receives \$423,875 and \$1,198,132 respectively; these will flow down to member local agencies by a formula adopted by the Council on May 3, 2021.
- For transit: "Similar to the CARES Act, the supplemental funding will be provided at 100-percent federal share, with no local match required. Funding will support expenses eligible under the relevant program, although the Act directs recipients to prioritize payroll and operational needs." [from FTA website]
- MCOG's draft 2021/22 budget included \$1,459,704 of new CRRSAA funds for MTA (no expiration), later moved to a new Information section of the budget tables, along with CARES Act funds carried over.
- Funds are also available through the FTA Section 5310 Elderly and Disabled Specialized Transit Program for applicants that were successful during the last grant cycle. A total of \$103,532 has been awarded to three specialized transit providers in Mendocino County.

Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5311 and 5311f

- MCOG's budget includes these programs, as funds for MTA are approved by MCOG resolution, although cash does not flow through MCOG's accounts.
- Annual 5311 regional apportionments are typically used by MTA for operations, now over \$800,000.
- MTA has been successful in winning competitive 5311f Intercity Bus Program grants, typically about \$300,000, for Route 65 operations and/or vehicles, with a required funding match.
- CARES and CRRSAA funds for transit flow through FTA's programs, subject to MCOG's approval and claimed directly through Caltrans. From CARES Phase 1, MTA was allocated \$557,349, fully claimed to date. In August 2020, MCOG approved 5311 CARES Phase 2 funds for MTA at \$1,068,573.

Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) for Housing

- Created by AB 101, state funding is provided for regional planning related to housing production and implementation of the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA).
- In 2020, MCOG amended its Joint Powers Agreement to include housing matters as a specific power.
- MCOG's 2020/21 budget was amended to add a grant of \$383,245, suballocated to member local agencies at 90 percent, by an adopted distribution formula.
- A new master agreement with the Department of Housing & Community Development has been executed to receive the grant funds.
- Eligible activities include providing technical assistance, performing infrastructure planning, and conducting feasibility studies.

STAFF REPORT

TITLE: Award of Triennial Performance Auditor Engagement for MCOG and Mendocino Transit Authority Audits, Fiscal Years 2018/19 through 2020/21

BACKGROUND:

The Transportation Development Act (TDA) requires that both MCOG and Mendocino Transit Authority (MTA) are subject to an independent performance audit every three years to ensure compliance. MCOG is responsible for engaging an auditor for both audits, paid from our administration budget. MCOG has allocated a budget amount not to exceed \$22,500, saved over three years for the two audits.

Consistent with MCOG's adopted Procurement Policies & Procedures Manual, I issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ), inviting six firms on March 22, 2022. The RFQ was also posted on the CALACT website, "a statewide, non-profit organization that has represented the interests of small, rural, and specialized transportation providers since 1984," of which MCOG is a member.

We have received two proposals by the due date of April 20, from Derek Wong of Michael Baker International (whom we engaged for the past three performance audits) and Moore & Associates. Both are known to be well qualified auditors.

According to TDA, MTA is to be consulted in the selection of an auditor. At this writing, a review committee of MCOG and MTA staff members is being convened to score and rank the proposals, using criteria specified in the RFQ.

I will report the committee's recommendation at our meeting on May 2 and be prepared to answer any questions at that time.

ACTION REQUIRED:

Award a contract to a qualified independent auditor to conduct the triennial performance audits of both MCOG and MTA for the three years ended June 30, 2021.

ALTERNATIVES:

None are identified.

RECOMMENDATION:

Award the triennial performance audit engagement contract of up to \$22,500 to the review committee's recommended consultant (to be identified) and authorize MCOG's Executive Director to execute the agreement.

Historical PCI Ukiah






BACKGROUND:

To assist local agencies, MCOG staff administered a competitive procurement process in FY 2020/21 to hire a consultant to develop individual Local Road Safety Plans (LRSP) for the County and all four cities, under one combined regional project.

The successful consultant (TJKM) was awarded a contract in January 2021, and has been working over the last fifteen months or so gathering data, conducting stakeholder outreach, and working with the local jurisdictions to develop individual safety plans for each agency.

The draft plans are now complete or nearly complete, and presentations to local agencies are scheduled as follows:

Fort Bragg City Council – April 25, 2022 Point Arena City Council – April 26, 2022 Willits City Council – May 11, 2022 Ukiah City Council – May 18, 2022 Board of Supervisors – June 21, 2022 (tentatively - on consent calendar)

As previously reported, this countywide project was funded with State grant funds, with the 10% local match provided by local agencies. Individual project budgets were as follows: Mendocino County (\$148,900); City of Ukiah (\$80,000); City of Point Arena (\$20,000); City of Fort Bragg (\$30,000) and City of Willits (\$30,000), for a total of \$308,900 available for consultant work. An additional \$8,000 in Planning, Programming & Monitoring (PPM) funds was programmed for MCOG staff time, for a total project budget of \$316,900.

The completion of these local safety plans coincides with Caltrans' Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Grant Cycle 11 "Call for Projects" which will be announced on 5/9/22, with an application due date of 9/12/22. *Per Caltrans' website, an LRSP (or equivalent) will be required for an agency to be eligible to apply for HSIP funds beginning with Cycle 11.*
